



OUR STRONG SHEPHERD



The psalmist cries out for mercy--on what basis does he receive mercy? How is he different from the wicked who go into the pit? (See especially verses 2 and 5).



What is the pit? Compare the use of the same word in Genesis 37 (Joseph's brothers cast him into a pit); Genesis 41 (Joseph is imprisoned in Egypt); Psalm 40:2 ("He drew me up from the pit of destruction, out of the miry bog, and set my feet upon a rock"); Isaiah 14:14 ("brought down to hell, to the sides of the pit"); Jeremiah 38 (Jeremiah was cast into a cistern [pit]). What does the pit represent in this psalm?



What word of warning or encouragement can we bring to a world facing pits of various kinds?



Should we wish for the evil and wicked to receive "their due reward"? How do we understand the intersection of mercy, justice, and retribution?



The psalmist calls the Lord his strength and shield. What do these terms mean? What do they encompass when taken together?



The psalmist moves from a heart that exults to a song that gives thanks. What can we learn from this transition from an inward emotion to an outward expression?



In verse 8, we move from the individual to the community. Why is it important to have not only a personal dependence on the Lord, but a corporate dependence as well? Why should we trust in the Lord together?



In this psalm, the Lord is rock, strength, shield, refuge, and shepherd. What attributes do these metaphors point to? Which do you feel most strongly in your life?



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
